

Leaving a legacy to Making Music in your will

How to draw up a Will

To leave a legacy you will need a will. The Law Society <u>www.lawsociety.org.uk</u> can help you find a local solicitors' firm or you could use a professional will writer (<u>www.ipw.org.uk</u>) or high street bank, which will be able to advise you on any tax benefits of your gift. As your circumstances change, your will might need to change as well, so remember to ensure your will is kept up to date and safe.

If you'd like to leave a legacy to Making Music in your will, then the information below will help you decide which type is right, and how to make sure your wishes are clear.

Types of Legacy

There are three main ways you can leave a gift in your Will:

- A share of your estate (residuary legacy)
- A specific sum (pecuniary legacy)
- A specific item

To include Making Music in your will, you can ask your solicitor to use one of the following suggested wordings:

For a share of your estate: I give all/a share (please state fraction/percentage) of the residue of my estate absolutely to The National Federation of Music Societies trading as Making Music of 8 Holyrood Street, London, SE1 2EL, Registered Charity in England and Wales no. 249219 and in Scotland no. SC038849, to be applied by The National Federation of Music Societies for (its charitable purposes/a specific purpose), and I further direct that the receipt of the Hon. Treasurer or any other proper officer of The National Federation of Making Music for the time being shall be sufficient discharge to my executors.

For a specific sum: I give to The National Federation of Music Societies trading as Making Music of 8 Holyrood Street, London, SE1 2EL, Registered Charity in England and Wales no. 249219 and in Scotland no. SC038849, absolutely, the sum of (amount in figures, amount in words) to be applied by The National Federation of Music Societies for (its charitable purposes/a specific purpose) and I further direct that the receipt of the Hon. Treasurer or any other proper officer of The National Federation of Music Societies for the time being shall be sufficient discharge to my executors.

For a specific item: I give to The National Federation of Music Societies trading as Making Music of 8 Holyrood Street, London, SE1 2EL, Registered Charity in England and Wales no. 249219 and in Scotland no. SC038849, absolutely, (write in here whatever item it is that you wish to give) to be applied by The National Federation of Music Societies (for its charitable purposes/a specific purpose) and I further direct that the receipt of the Hon. Treasurer or any other proper officer of The National Federation of Music Societies for the time being shall be sufficient discharge to my executors.
